

FRIENDS OF CALLIGRAPHY COMBINED COUNCIL MEETING, 17 JULY 2011, 10 AM, Georgianna Greenwood library, Berkeley. Council Members present: Meredith Klein, Laura Bernabei, Jerry Lehman, Teresa Doane, Jennifer Enault, Georgianna Greenwood, Elizabeth Nisperos; Incoming Council Members: Dean Robino, Elena Caruthers; Outgoing Council Members: Megan Lucas (Excused), Jessie Evans (Excused). Marcia Friedman, Alphabet Editor (unable to attend). Guests: Dorothy Yuki, Susie Taylor. Meredith suggested the old and new Council members along with the guests introduce themselves. The meeting was called to order at 10:25. Dean moved to approve the 1 May 2011 minutes as corrected. Georgianna 2nd, all approved. Jerry moved to approve the AGM Minutes, 22 May 2011, as corrected. Teresa 2nd, all approved. The calendar of Meetings and Activities for the coming FOC year was discussed and approved by the Council.

MEMBERSHIP: Jenn reported 242 renewal members, 7 new members, 9 honorary and 38 group exchanges. There was a discussion on the use of e-mail instead of the post office mails for membership renewals. Honorary members haven't received the renewal form in the past; Georgianna asked if these forms should be sent to these members, as there is information on them that might be needed.

TREASURY: Dean presented the treasurer's report. The yearend June 30, 2011 figures showed a surplus. Dean, Teresa and Meredith drafted a preliminary budget for FOC year 2011-2012. Teresa moved to approve this budget, Jenn 2nd, all approved. Dean will draft a document as to which FOC financial documents need to be stored and for how long. She will contact David Winkler about his research into this.

WORKSHOPS: The summer workshop with Lisa Engelbrecht was full and enjoyed by all the students. Carla did her usual job managing every detail. David Winkler was a terrific host, contributions from Dorothy, Laura and Debra Ferreboeuf were greatly appreciated, nametags calligraphed by Fran Silver.

The Liesbet Boudens workshop, which filled immediately, with a current waiting list of 1, will be held August 13-14 at Ft. Mason. Liesbet and Carl Rohrs will give a lecture August 12 at Ft. Mason; Elizabeth, Laura and Dorothy volunteered to organize hospitality.

Sheila Waters is not available in the fall, but could teach in April 2012. She would like a 3-day class analyzing manuscript hands, which would move to develop the students' individual hands. Judy Detrick will hold a gilding workshop, possibly October 22-23.

Trivial Pursuits will be held on January 14, at the same location as last year. Dorothy has 6 teachers with one alternate. She will make tote bags and Jerry will do the names, Laura again volunteered to serve lunch, Jerry and Vicky Lee will fill the bags, David Brookes will do the name tags and Dorothy will do the "dance cards".

There was a suggestion at the summer workshop that there be evaluations for workshops and classes. The discussion was tabled until the next meeting.

The Council is searching for an interim workshop chairman. Teresa volunteered to be workshop scheduler.

FORT MASON CLASSES: Judy Detrick's class was well received by the beginning students.

Melissa Titone has 12 students signed up for her Copperplate class. Patricia Coltrin has 9 sign-ups so far.

Elizabeth mentioned that the ProArts gallery in Oakland has issued a "Call for Art" for a show to be held in 2 or 3 months and she thought perhaps Fort Mason pieces could be entered.

Elizabeth would like to start an Envelope Exchange among the Ft Mason students.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING REPORT: The May meeting was well attended and reported to be the best ever. The donation for a bench at Santa Sabina honoring Carla and Jean Tenret has totaled \$1,700 to date with 32 people contributing so far. Sister Margaret will soon be sending thank-you notes for the contributions. A motion was presented to increase the AGM lecture stipend for speaker Mary Laird from \$100 to \$200, in consideration of her substantial lecture presentation and preparation. Jenn moved to approve the motion, Elena 2nd, all approved.

PUBLICATION AND MAILING: There were no reports on publications. There is a need for someone to do calligraphic initials on the front cover of the Directory. Judy Detrick will be asked to do the graphic design.

OLD BUSINESS: The discussion on the e-mail policy was tabled for this meeting.

Student Membership was discussed at the May meeting, and Meredith reported that at least two other guilds have memberships for students. The decision by FOC on student fees was tabled.

Facebook: Jenn and Dean will inquire into other societies for information on their Facebook policies.

NEW BUSINESS: Plans for the Holiday Party were discussed. Georgianna will host, and Alan Blackman will provide entertainment. Elena agreed to design the flyer that should be mailed in October. Laura will coordinate hospitality.

While on a visit to Hallmark, Georgia Deaver visited Rick Cusick and was impressed with his extensive collection of calligraphy. She asked Georgianna and Meredith if FOC might be interested in inviting him for a lecture. Georgianna offered

to look into this. She presented options, including a PowerPoint presentation by Rick or a panel format with Georgia and Carl Rohrs interviewing him. Susie suggested combining this event with FOC and the library. Potential dates could be in spring of 2012. A discussion followed and all agreed FOC should pursue this activity.

Meredith presented a proposal to make a one-time adjustment to the former Alphabet editor's stipend, in acknowledgment that the increase following that term was substantial. The increase was the right thing to do, considering the level of expertise, experience and resources needed to perform this important work and we had not been paying enough. A motion was made by Jerry, considering the substantial increase in stipend from \$5,000 to \$7,500, and because FOC has the money, to authorize a one-time adjustment of \$1,000 to the stipend of the previous Alphabet editor, who edited the publication for three years under the same circumstances but at a lower stipend. Elizabeth $2^{\rm nd}$, all approved.

Calligraphy Northwest requested for guilds to send contributions to the next conference. The discussion was tabled.

Judy Detrick has investigated PayPal for payment for FOC membership fees. There is a fee of 2.02% plus \$.30 per transaction. There is no set-up fee or monthly charge, users don't have to have a PayPal account and major credit cards are accepted. FOC would need to provide proof of our 501(c)(3) status, provide our bank account number and a contact person (Judy volunteered for this position). Dean will research further and make a presentation at the next Council meeting. Laura will research the subject of purchasing a digital projector for FOC teachers and lectures by surveying the use of a projector by teachers and/or other societies, and report back at the next meeting.

Marcia Friedman's agenda item of FOC participation in a Cheryl Wheeler exhibit here in San Francisco was deferred until a future meeting when Marcia can be present for a more informative discussion.

Laura moved to adjourn the meeting, Teresa 2nd all approved.

FRIENDS OF CALLIGRAPHY COUNCIL MEETING, 11 SEPTEMBER 2011 at the home of Jerry Lehman, San Francisco. Council members present: Meredith Klein, Jerry Lehman, Dean Robino, Laura Bernabei, Elena Caruthers, Jennifer Enault, Georgianna Greenwood, Elizabeth Nisperos. Excused: Teresa Doane. Marcia Friedman, Alphabet Editor. Guests: Susie Taylor, Dorothy Yuki. The meeting was called to order at 10:35. Jenn moved to approve the 17 July 2011 minutes as corrected. Dean 2nd all approved.

MEMBERSHIP: Jenn reported 343 members (325 renewals, 9 new, 9 Honorary). So far FOC has \$1,000 more than same time last year in membership dues.

TREASURY: Dean presented the treasurer's report. The Nonprofit filings (due by November 15) will be sent to the accountant, David Rabin, who handled our filings last year. Dean reported that IRS Publication 1771 requires that FOC acknowledge cash donations of \$250 or more (no goods or services). Meredith said we do this. Dean and Teresa are researching where and how long FOC documents should be stored. Dean suggested that there could be a way of keeping some information available on an Internet "Cloud", but there needs to be more research on this matter.

WORKSHOPS: The Liesbet Boudens workshop was full with 21 students; 40 people attended the lecture by Carl Rohrs and Liesbet, to make for a successful presentation. Judy Detrick will teach Modern Gilding October 29-30. Rebecca Wild (Oregon artist and calligrapher) will teach Lines, Layers & Klee, tentatively set for February 4-5. Sheila Waters has agreed to a 3-day workshop with tentative dates for April 27-29 or April 20-22, with the first day to be held at Main SF Public Library, the rest at Fort Mason. Sheila said she could teach a separate one-day workshop, and suggested Versals. Elena Caruthers suggested a venue and will follow up. Helen Fung will host Sheila. Fall/winter 2012 is aiming for Christopher Haanes, from Norway, to teach. FOC will try to coordinate with Cheerio or other groups, to spread the transportation financing; if this doesn't work the date may get pushed to 2013. We will also try to schedule Bill Kemp in 2012. Linnea Lundquist proposed Luca Barcellona from Italy for a February 2013 workshop. She would host Luca, and thought it could work to hold the workshop in Half Moon Bay. She would coordinate with Society for Calligraphy to have him for Letters 2013 and possibly Portland, so we could split transportation costs. Marcia suggested Ewan Clayton for an April 2013 workshop and offered to coordinate. The Council was in agreement with all of these plans.

Georgia Deaver asked if FOC might be interested in holding a continuing workshop where the same instructor would teach once a month for 3 months. With this format, the students would have time to practice in-between and do homework. The Chicago guild does this. Meredith contacted Linda Ness about their successful series. The Council tabled the discussion for a later time.

There was again a discussion of purchasing a digital projector for the use of FOC teachers. The cost would be roughly \$2,000. This item was tabled until the next Council meeting. Laura will present a report of her research into the topic.

Meredith is creating a form for Student Workshop Evaluations which can be given to students and returned to the workshop chair; she will have this for the next meeting.

FORT MASON CLASSES: The Ft. Mason brochure will be completed by Georgianna for the November mailing. Melissa Titone's copperplate class is full with 16 students, and there are 12 students signed up for Patricia Coltrin's Italic cursive handwriting class, to be held Nov. 1-22.

PUBLICATIONS: Marcia reported that the Alphabet is on schedule for the October mailing. She has several articles brewing for the next issue, one from Chris Colasurdo on legible and nonlegible calligraphy. She is considering including book reviews.

Jodie Meese will design the 2011/2012 Directory cover and Ruth Korch will do the initials, based on the Liesbet Boudens workshop. Judy Detrick will do the graphic design. Meredith contacted Brandes about printing; the price will be relatively the same as last year. It was suggested that the Directory include a sentence that journals of Exchange Societies are available at Special Collections in the SF Main Library.

The Council discussed Susie Taylor's list of exchange societies, some of whose publications will only be available on electronic access and others of whom have not exchanged with us in years. The Council decided to drop exchanges with societies that do not exchange paper copies; except further inquiry will be made into Pacific Center for the Book Arts (Dorothy Yuki) and Chicago Calligraphy Collective (Georgianna). Dean volunteered to research some exchange groups who have not sent us anything in a while. Susie commended Hobie MacQuarrie's work organizing the publications that made it possible for her to evaluate the exchange group list.

MAILING: For the October 6 mailing, JoAnn Brand has called together the mailing crew. Alphabet #37:1, Bulletin 104, Holiday Party invitation, and Trivial Pursuits flyer will be included in this mailing.

MEETINGS & EVENTS: The Holiday Party invitation is being designed by Elena. Laura will be in charge of hospitality. Alan Blackman will entertain, and Georgianna again graciously will open her house for the event.

Georgianna reported that she has contacted Rick Cusick about a PowerPoint lecture sometime in April or March. It could be an interview format with Georgianna, Carl Rohrs and/or Georgia Deaver leading the questions. Mr. Cusick was interested, and would consider participating.

OLD BUSINESS: Jenn has set up an FOC Facebook page of which she will be a moderator. She requested that Judy Detrick, Dean, Jessie and Meredith be included as moderators. FOC received requests from Calligraphy Northwest for a donation to their conference. Susie suggested that we could send them 500 back issues of the Alphabet to be included in their welcome bag. Georgianna suggested FOC could send \$300 and we should inquire if other local guilds would be interested in contributing the additional \$200 to help sponsor a \$500 evening affair. Meredith will contact Pacific Scribes and Sea Scribes about joining FOC for this donation. Elizabeth moved to authorize a \$300 donation to the Calligraphy Northwest. Dean 2nd all approved.

At the July Council meeting Marcia had requested FOC consider sponsoring a small exhibition of Cheryl Wheeler's calligraphic interpretation of her lyrics and songs. There would be 10 to 40 pieces to be shown, possibly in March; a request was sent to Main SF Public Library. Elena suggested that Freight & Salvage might be interested in hosting this exhibit. This item was tabled for FOC to hear more details to proceed.

Georgianna requested that the November meeting be moved from the 13th to the 20th. The Council agreed. Jerry moved to adjourn the meeting, Georgianna 2^{nd} , all approved.
