De Ann Singh March Lecture

Calligraphy Goes to the Movies



■he Friends of Calligraphy hosted a virtual lecture by Hollywood's favorite calligrapher, DeAnn Singh, who dazzled attendees with calligraphy movie magic. At the beginning of the lecture, DeAnn explained that she always likes to share her stories and experiences with others by saying, Let me tell you this story. And tell

stories she did! The lecture was full of stories from DeAnn's forty-plus years living and lettering in the Los Angeles area and how she came to specialize in historical writing for movies and TV.

There is No Script for this Kind of Work.

I actually found a book that had incantations in it to vanquish the devil! DeAnn said with a little bit of disbelief about her good luck. She explained that when she has a calligraphy job to make a prop or set piece for a movie or TV, they don't give you a script. There's little or oftentimes no art direction given for the calligraphy. She giggled when she explained that sometimes you get to make up a hand or the look of the letterforms and the text itself. How cool is that?

Mr. DeMille, the Calligraphy is Ready for Its Close-up!

DeAnn told stories about some of her experiences making calligraphy to be used as a hand prop. This calligraphy work involves research or knowledge of materials typical to the time period of the story, prepping the materials, and making several exact copies of a piece. DeAnn shared the example of sharpening a pencil by cutting it with a knife so that it looked like an old-timey pencil. She also has to prepare the materials that the calligraphy will go on, like staining Pergamenata parchment paper to create a look of antiquity and making sure there are no watermarks in the paper used for the piece if it was supposed to be old, like if the actor held the paper up to the light.

DeAnn had a lot of stories to tell about her calligraphy as props for the movie *National Treasure 2: Book of Secrets*. I mean, it's a movie with the word book in the title about a time before computers and desktop

publishing when everything was hand written. So yeah, they totally needed a calligrapher. The prop master for the movie told her that they wanted everything to be as authentic as possible. She studied a real facsimile from the Library of Congress, tracing over acetate so she could practice and get her writing as close as possible to the real thing.

DeAnn said that if you make any kind of movie prop, you have to make a minimum of 2, but most of the time, it's more like 3 to 5, and they have to be exactly alike. What's the most copies of a prop that she made for a movie? 100! She made 100 exactly-alike John Wilkes Booth diary pages for *National Treasure 2: Book of Secrets*.

When I say that DeAnn's calligraphy is on fire, I'm not just speaking in idioms. In a scene in *National Treasure 2: Book of Secrets*, a page from John Wilkes Booth's diary is thrown into a fire and then pulled out. The calligraphy prop page had to go into actual fire, partially burn, be retrieved out of the fire, and still have the writing on the fragment crucial to the plot be legible. DeAnn described how she prepared the paper with liquid fire retardant and Super 77 spray adhesive to get part of it to burn and part of it not to burn.

In another scene in *National Treasure 2: Book of Secrets*, Ed Harris burns a letter prop that DeAnn made. How many times can you burn the same letter? If you're Ed Harris, the answer is 60 times! Over and over, DeAnn wrote the letter, then Ed Harris burned it. Not only did DeAnn have to handwrite the letter exactly the same way every time, she also had to fold it a certain way and add a wax seal. 60 times! Somebody give that calligrapher an Oscar!



The Writing on the Walls

DeAnn spoke about how a lot of the calligraphy she does for movies and TV is for set dressing,

that is, items that are not touched by the actors but complete the look of the set. She has created calligraphic set pieces ranging from certificates and degrees hung on the walls for doctors' offices to ancient scrolls.

Quiet on the Set!

Some of the calligraphy projects DeAnn worked on required her to work on the set where all of the action happens with the directors, film crew, and the actors and actresses of the movie. DeAnn related an anecdote about the letter-burning scene with Ed Harris and Helen Mirren. In a vast and completely dark warehouse studio, DeAnn was churning out all of those letters for Ed Harris to burn at a makeshift desk of a door laid on a sawhorse with a spotlight for lighting. Imagine total darkness with DeAnn working in the light of an industrial-strength spotlight. Here's what happened as the cameras started rolling...

Director: Quiet on the Set!

Assistant Director: Quiet on the sSet!

Director: Action!

DeAnn's Phone: DOOT DE LE LOOT, DE DOOT DE LE LOOT!! DOOT DE LE LOOT, DE DOOT DE LE LOOT!!!

Director: Cut!

DeAnn's phone was in her purse enthusiastically ringing away, reverberating throughout the otherwise silent sound studio. And she was in the spotlight-literally! What a moment! DeAnn quickly silenced and turned her phone off of course, the cast and crew resumed filming the scene, and the movie grossed \$459.2 million.

The Cutting Room Floor

DeAnn said that you can never be sure all of the work you put in will actually show up in the final cut. Close-up shots of the calligraphy or even whole scenes might be edited out. For example, DeAnn created a calligraphy prop for the movie *The King of California* starring Evan Rachel Wood and Michael Douglas. She calligraphed a Spanish gothic hand on Arches Text Wove paper. She was really pleased with how it came out, but it didn't show up in the movie. For the presidents' book prop in *National Treasure: Book of Secrets*, DeAnn duplicated the handwriting of 10-15 presidents. Still, she said, only a fraction of the work made it into the movie.

Listening to DeAnn speak about her calligraphy for the movies and TV has me ready for a calligraphy movie marathon filled with shots of hand-lettered documents, artifacts, certificates, letters, books, maps, and scrolls. Thank you, DeAnn, for this wonderful lecture and for all of the calligraphic delights you've created for the Silver Screen. You are a national treasure.



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

obert "Bob" Eugene Berner, August 12, 1932 - March 1, 2023, enjoyed a productive and joyful life through his 90th birthday. His parents were Fred and Evelyn Berner of Orlando, Florida. His grandparents, both graduates from the Chicago Art Institute, encouraged his natural talents to draw and

paint when he was quite young, and this influence became a foundation for lifelong artistic pursuits.

After serving in the Navy during the Korean War, Bob majored in Industrial Design at Pratt Institute in New York and moved to San Francisco in the 1960's. He had a following of fans with his geometric, op art, organic blend of painting, with many commissioned pieces. He worked as a scientific illustrator at U.C. Berkeley in the Department of Anthropology. During that counter-culture era he created the logo for the Society for Individual Rights: SIR and worked on publications about the movement.

In the late 1960's Bob moved to sunny Sonoma. I first met Bob at his home, halfway up the bucolic terrain of the Sonoma Mountains in the mid-1970's. He and his beloved partner of 54 years, wine historian William F. Heintz, were a delightful team. Their warmth and graciousness created a welcoming presence for all friends.

An early member of Friends of Calligraphy, Bob was loved for his cheerfulness, creativity, and wit; he could light up a room at FOC events. According to early membership records, Bob joined FOC in 1978. However, Bob and I attended a social for Don Moy in the East Bay, prior to Don's trip to lowa for study with Fr. Edward Catich early in the summer of 1976.

"Berner," as he was affectionately known by his friends, always had an eclectic approach to both life and calligraphy. His art included painting, drawing, murals, sculpture, and calligraphy. He even collaborated with famed composer Lou Harrison to create the characters and design sets for a puppet opera.

The titles of his early exhibition pieces in Kalligraphia 1 (1979) II (1982) and III (1985), respectively, give an insight into his out-of-the-box approach to art: No Matter How You Fold It, It's God!, Message from Babel and With a Little Bit of Bloomin' Luck. His calligraphy typically consisted of diverse mediums and materials.

In the 1970's Bob furthered his fascination with calligraphy by way of Arne Wolf and Alan Blackman. Continued study included Hans Meier, Thomas Ingmire, David Meckelburg, Jim Moran, Jaki Svaren and Karlgeorg Hoefer. In the early 1980's Bob began working with computer graphics systems. He opened the Sonoma Scriptorium and Graphics Arts Center in downtown Sonoma. Later in the 1980's he partnered with friend Gina Roman to form Image Access Center, a computer graphics design firm. Examples of their work included the Sonoma Pets Lifeline logo and video graphics for KRCB, Channel 22. In the 1990's he became involved with the Collage Collective of Sonoma and helped to create the *Doors* show, where backyards became galleries using upcycled doors.

Bob made a worthy contribution to the FOC Newsletter in the Fall 1980 issue, V. 6, No. 1, p. 7, with his report on the Wangenheim Room of the San Diego Public Library. Besides a brief history of the Rare Book Room, provided by Julius Wangenheim of San Francisco, Bob listed many important documents and books he viewed.

Bob's other interests included dancing, music, gardening, landscaping, history, archaelogy, poetry and writing. He maintained his personal journals over seven decades, detailing his art processes. Bob studied consciousness and took workshops through the Institute of Noetic Sciences. He and Bill shared notes on meditation and the philosophies of spiritual practices.

A Celebration of Bob's Life was held on April 15 in Sonoma. Any gifts in memory of Bob can be made to Homeless Action Sonoma or Pets Lifeline.

Journal Bits & Monoline Lettering

was inspired when Connie Furgason leafed through her many and varied journals to introduce her process in the workshop, "Journal Bits and Monoline Lettering." She has journals for experiments and journals for flowers and travel and all manner of themes. In her Zoom workshop on April 15 and 16 2023, we focused on Connie's techniques for monoline lettering on Saturday — with many, many delightful pages of lettering samples, and watercolor journal painting on Sunday.

Here are a few of my take-aways from Saturday's class focused on monoline lettering:


- Connie recommends keeping your pencil insanely sharp. Use sandpaper to tidy up the tip between uses of the pencil sharpener.
- Turn the pencil as you write to keep always writing on the sharpest point.
- Use pressure release with the pencil, just as you would with a nib and pen.
- Connie reminded us to focus on the end of the line of a letter. In other words, don't trail off into a wispy nothing when ending a letter, which leaves the eye nowhere to land.
- Vary and contrast lettering styles, heights, and thicknesses. Play with different combinations.
- Experiment with stretching text out across the width of your page or section. Vary the height between lines of text to create an interesting and varied bundle of words on the page.

Sunday's class focused on watercolor journal painting:

- Connie's style is to paint the essence of what she's capturing in a journal watercolor painting, adding lettering to complete the piece.
- Connie shared her preference and use of Daniel Smith watercolor dot cards, which she feels are a better-quality pigment and longer lasting than

- other brands of watercolor dot cards. Using a dot card at its lower price point and wide availability—even on Amazon—offers a huge variety of colors to experiment with, which can be purchased later in tubes of preferred colors. She cuts the cards in half for easier handling.
- When sketching the drawing initially, she recommends breaking the image down into the basic shapes of the image; then she quickly sketches in a bit of shaping detail.
- Connie uses her 1/2" flat watercolor brush predominantly and lays down pigment in the least number of strokes she possibly can. Then she uses the tip of that same brush to add detail.
- Connie showed us a technique to remove paint with a piece cut from the end of a Mr. Clean Magic Eraser. Gently rub the eraser to lift and remove paint, both wet and dry, until nothing remains.
- Connie prefers using hot press watercolor paper, as she likes the way the paint sits on the smoother paper and how it takes longer to dry, allowing more time to work with it.
- Her recommendation is to work on multiple journal pages simultaneously, so work can dry and you keep your forward momentum.


What a treat it was to learn with Connie, energizing us to explore with confidence our own monoline lettering and watercolor journaling. As one participant shared, being a student of Connie's was like taking lessons from a friend who is all too happy to share her passion. These two classes were packed with helpful information and limitless inspiration – a delightful way to spend the weekend with letters, pencil, and paintbrush.



Annual Membership Message

Thank you to everyone who joined or renewed membership in FOC this past year. We have grown and as of this writing, we have nearly 700 members!

Prompt Renewal

My annual pitch. I appreciate it SO much when you renew promptly. Mailed renewals are sent in June; emailed renewals in late June/early July. If you renew right when you get the notice, it's done and you don't have to think about it any more. And it helps both me and FOC.

If you renew in July, I don't need to send you a reminder in August/September. Also, prompt renewal saves FOC money. If you renew before the first mailing of the year, you are in the regular mailings, which cost about 90¢ per envelope on average. After the mailing, I have to send first class; that costs FOC about \$3 in October increasing to \$9.65 (or more) after the December mailing, when the weight of multiple issues means we need to use priority mail. Renewing on time also means I don't have to make an extra trip to the PO to send you catch-up mailings.

We try to keep our information current. When you receive your mailed or emailed renewal form, please check the information and let me know of any changes at gkle@sbcglobal.net.
